- More sustainable, long term, multiple benefits
- More systematic approach and includes more groups
- Flood Risk Management (Scotland) Act 2009

State of the art



- Some barriers have already been examined:
- Farmers
- Local Authority
- Communities
- Policy

There are some examples of NFM

Why is it still not really happening?

 But little experience and understanding, especially role of non-farmers







Using multi-level governance literature

- Formal and informal institutions
- Interactions across administrative boundaries
- Actor networks and role of state and non-state actors



What did we do?



18 semi-structured interviews in the UK to understand:

experiences, attitudes and perceptions of NFM and challenges of doing NFM





















What did we find out?



1. Resource constraints:

resource intensive & requires more partnership-working

- Knowledge & evidence gaps: can't quantify flood risk reduction.
- 3. Knowledge use and legacy:
 Challenges exacerbated by misfit with existing expertise.





What did we find out? Cont...



4. Legislation and policies

 Can hinder adoption of NFM measures, and reinforce the above challenges
 e.g. Cost-Benefit Analysis

5. Coordination and collaboration

- Requires new ways of working collaboration
- Insufficient time for partnership-building
- Lack of support and skills





- Not just about rules, resources and evidence gaps (although they are important)
- ➤ Also about less tangible stuff knowledge, ways of seeing the world

So what?

➤ This gets hidden behind calls for more evidence but tackling evidence gaps alone won't ever be enough





We need to be radical

> To deal with change, conflict, complexity and uncertainty

Some ideas how

- Move beyond mono-disciplinarity
- Collaboration and partnership working
- Use different kinds of knowledge
- Focus on learning and adapting

....but it is *messy!* No quick fixes available!
